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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Trinity College for Women (Arts and Science) is situated in Namakkal to Mohanur state highway (SH-95). The college is so accessible that it is just 4 kms away from Namakkal town. This college is permanently affiliated to Periyar University, Salem-636011, Tamil Nadu state, India. It is recognized with **2f & 12(b) status** from the University Grants Commission, New Delhi. It was started in the year **2000** by Trinity Academy & Charitable Trust with the aim of imparting higher education to women in general and women belonging to economically weaker sections of the society. **“Knowledge is power”** is the soul motto of our college.

The College aims to install **“Discipline, Education and Service”** by creating an abode of carriers. It endeavours to provide the environment and opportunities that are necessary for the development of integrated personality of the girls which help them grow in faith and love with due emphasis on traditional values and progressive ideas.

Students are given adequate training to face any challenges with Self-confidence and Self-discipline.

At present the college offers 11 UG courses, 7 PG courses under choice based credit system. Now, 3 M.Phil. Research courses are offered in the Departments English, Commerce and Computer Science. We have Ph.D., Research Programmes in the subjects of Tamil and Commerce.

- Majority of the students come from economically disadvantaged backgrounds and are unable to pay fees and require financial assistance more.
- Absence of undertaking funded research and consultancy projects.

- Being located in a rural area, as well as being an only women's college, the college struggles to improve the student enrolment status.
- To make 100% students employable for reputed industries.
- Provide separate hostel & bus facilities.
- Creating awareness about Digital Learning.
- Many of the students are coming from rural areas. They have completed their school education through the regional language of Tamil. The English language is mandatory for all higher education, so extra coaching is needed for those students.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution is Permanently affiliated to Periyar University, Salem and follows the CBCS(Choice Based Credit Systems) curriculum prescribed by the university. At the commencement of the academic year, the academic calendar is prepared. The timetable is prepared for every semester which includes a Value added programme also. In order to liven up students, many seminars, conferences are conducted. Remedial classes are conducted for slow learners. Teachers take dynamic participation in University Examination and Evaluation work.

All the 11 UG and 07 PG programs are offered with the Choice Based Credit System/Elective course system. The institution has offered Value-added courses/add-on certificate courses apart from the university prescribed curriculum.

Periyar University curriculum offers courses related to cross-cutting issues like Professional Ethics, Gender Equality, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in UG/PG programs. Courses in the curriculum include experiential learning through project work/internship. At the institutional level, several activities are conducted by clubs and cells. Women's forum, Entrepreneurship Development Cell, Eco Green Club, National Service Scheme, Youth Red Cross etc., has organized various activities on human values, Environmental studies etc. The college celebrates various days(s) to make the students aware of the cultural, environmental surroundings, and its impact on human life.

Feedback collected from all stakeholders like students, teachers and alumni by the institution. Feedback thus collected is analysed by the IQAC Cell, communicated to the concerned, and reported to the Management. Actions are taken based on feedback itemized by the stakeholders.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Trinity College for Women centers on the intellectual, social and the emotional development of the students. The college follows government norms on the admission process and it is a well administered and transparent process of admission. To develop & train the advanced learners who are identified based on their performance in their internal and University examinations, they act as peer teachers in helping their fellow- friends in the learning process. The faculty motivated the students to get the relevant research projects & publish papers in the field of their choice. To develop slow learners in the academic process, additional reading materials are provided to increase their understanding capacity. Counseling was given to them from time to time.

With the intention to develop critical thinking among the students, various departments have conducted competitions, industrial visits, workshops, exhibitions, problem solving methods with ICT Tools. The Management highly concentrates on recruiting well qualified Faculty members based on UGC norms to serve as full time teachers. The evaluation procedure is elaborated and the students are assessed on CIA, assignments, practical & projects. The students are given multiple opportunities to succeed. The University results are a democratic process & the internal marks should be uploaded in the University portal. The program outcome and the course outcome are designed by the University. Online student satisfaction survey is also included that provides the information in action that can be taken to maintain higher levels of satisfaction and to improve student learning experience in the institution.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Our College received Partial Financial Assistance from the Tamil Nadu State Council for Science &

Technology (TNSCST), Chennai for organizing **Computer Literacy Programme for Kolli Hills SC&ST Students**. It was conducted by the Department of Computer Science.

An ecosystem has been created in the institution. It has a practice of conducting multifarious programs periodically including entrepreneurship programmes for the benefit of students.

Our Institution motivates our faculty and students for publishing more research articles in reputed journals. The institute bestows facilities like Digital library to assist them in doing original research work for publication. Our college got appreciation certificates from The President, Lathuvadi village, The District Youth Officer - Nehru Yuva Kendra, Namakkal and obtained Green Campus Award from Pasumai (Green), Namakkal. Our Institution is keen on extension activities to the neighboring areas. The students are motivated to participate in such awareness and social out-reach programmes intermittently marshaled by our service clubs. Our College has been engaged in creating green covers in the nearby areas as a part of social responsibilities.

Apart from that we received a fund from the IIT - Delhi under the scheme of Unnat Bharat Abhiyan for Implementation of various activities in adopted five Villages of Namakkal District like Vagurampatti, Aniyapuram, Parali, and Tholur and Pettapalayam. We got certificates of appreciation from the president of Tholur, Aniyapuram Namakkal Inner Wheel, NIMA, MMA, Rotary Club and Lions Club.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Ample physical necessities are always playing an ultimate role in pre-eminent institutions. In the way, Trinity College for Women have consisted so many physical facilities which are incredible and very utilitarian to the entire pupil in the college. Chalk and Board system have been overcome by digital teaching methodology through LCD projectors, Desktop, and Google meet and so on. ICT Teaching has taken part as a leading methodology for the students by the members of Learning Management System. The Wi-Fi has been connected with all. The college is fully equipped With ICT tools such as smart Classrooms, English language laboratory, Conference hall and ICT centers.

Our institution have fully air conditioned auditorium available with the capacity of 2500 members. Maintain the regular upkeep of the infrastructure and its facilities which is to be used by faculty members and the students for various programmes. The institution has allotted annual budget for the expenditure to maintain the infrastructure facilities.

Library helps for a learning process and gain knowledge. In our library the students and the faculty members easily access books and journals through KOHA software. The college has joined as a member in N-List and NDLI that all the staff members and the students can search E- Books, E-Journals, E-Magazines, Videos, and Ph.D. thesis etc., at anywhere at any time through their mobile phones. All the staff members and students have joined as a member of National Digital Library of India at free of cost.

Student Support and Progression

The main aim of the college is to enrich the students' knowledge, moral, ethical and social values. By providing quality education, the students can sharpen their skills to great extent which will help them to flourish

with flying colors. Career Guidance and Counseling Cell ensure personal development of students. They actively participate in soft-skills programmes, industrial visits and educational trips. Part- time Medical Officers pay visit our institution periodically

Our institution provides an excellent prospect to expose the hidden talents of the students through Cultural Fest and Sports Events. This had become a platform for the student's growth where they could boost up their confidence, team spirit and they exhibit their potential in extracurricular activities. They got many awards in various ventures.

The College offers training for students to prepare for Competitive Examinations. The College produces responsible, competent citizens to fulfill their professional, social and national obligations. In tune with the Vision and Mission, the campus is vibrant with many activities.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The New Education Policy introduced by the Central Government of India in 2020. It consists of new innovative ideas fitting to the changing times. This system is based on a comprehensive learning process rather than rote learning. It enables a student of higher education to learn employable skills and essential skills. Since the system is not included in the University curriculum we strive to bring it into practice from the coming academic year.

We organized more innovative programmes related to the Electoral Literacy Club. Our College NSS Cell and Election Department of Namakkal district, Tamil Nadu state jointly conducted a workshop entitled “Demonstration of Elector programme through Android Phone” on 30.9.19 in our College campus. The Election Commission’s new mega Electors Verification Programme (EVP), which seeks to update electoral rolls through crowd sourcing, was launched across the country recently. Under the programme, a voter from each family will get a username and password, allowing a person to upload all documents related to electoral registration and tag similar details about his or her family members. “Online, a voter can go to the National Voter Service Portal (NVSP) website and do the desired registration or on Voter helpline mobile app of the EC. Special Camp for voter’s list inclusion, deletion and correction of names in the Electoral Roll

held in our College campus on 11th February 2021. This program was arranged by the National Service Scheme. Forms of New Voters Enrolment – Form 6A distributed by Mr. S. Kumar, Village Administrative Officer, Kondichettipatti village, Namakkal Taluk & District. Nearly 100 students who have completed their age of 18 (Before born on 31.12.2002) have utilized that opportunity. Awareness Programme on “Significance of Voting ” National Service Scheme and Electoral Literary Club, Trinity College for Women Namakkal jointly organized a one day voter’s awareness event on 19th March 2021 in our College campus. The main aim of this programme, to create voting awareness of our College, new voters with the importance of encouraging more young voters to actively take part in the upcoming Tamil Nadu Assembly Elections to be held on 06th April 2021. A debate was also held in the title of “If we issue our vote, for esteem or shame” on 19.03.2021. Dr. Arasuparameswaran, Director – Academic of the College was the debate adjudicator. 4 per team, 8 students have taken part in that debate. Celebrations of National Voters Day – 25.01.2022 Trinity College for Women, Namakkal has organized a National Voters Day Pledge administered by fresh voters and faculty members of College of 25th January 2022. This day was observed with the motive of spreading awareness among young new voters. New voters, existing voters and staff members of Trinity College for Women took pledge to uphold the democratic traditions of our country and the dignity of free, fair and peaceful elections and to vote in every election fearlessly and without being influenced by considerations of religion, race, community, caste, language or any inducement. This voter’s pledge event was held through the platform of Google Meet. It was organized by the Electoral Literacy Forum in association with NSS, YRC & RRC of the College. Many young new voters enthusiastically participated in that event.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

- The schedule for Class Assessment Tests, Sessional Examinations and Assignments are published in the Academic Calendar, which is available long before the start of each session.
- The internal examination schedule is set at the start of the semester in the form of an academic calendar.
- The evaluation technique consists of internal examinations held during the semester to check and report on the student's periodic performance.
- The concerned subject teacher keeps the record of all internal exams, e.g., Midterm exam and model exam, if it is not secret at the university level.
- This strategy is also useful for the development of a student's personality. After displaying the student's examination papers, the student's copy is maintained in the internal-examination section. In the same session, the markings can be observed and copied.
- Both UG & PG classes, a student has to attend the internal examination compulsorily. There is no exemption. The marks are sent to the university to add in the semester mark-sheet.
- Model Answers and marking scheme is prepared by every subject teacher before valuation.

Class Assessment Test

- After Valuation, marks are displayed on dates mentioned in the academic calendar by the faculty members. Assessment copies are shown to the students. Some questions have specific remarks of the value for awarding less marks.

Practical Examination

- Evaluation is done with transparency based on different parameters like Teachers Assessment, Practical Records, Performance and Viva-Voce.

Assignments

- Assignment questions are discussed with students. The students submit three assignments to the concerned class faculty members.

Internal Assessment Marks:

- Internal Assessment Marks which comprises teacher assessment and sessional exam marks are conveyed to students.

Internal/external examination related grievances

- For Examination and Evaluation, the institution has devised a time-bound system.
- An Examination Cell is responsible for dealing with examination-related difficulties, both internal and external.
- The Examination Cell is supervised by Exam Cell convenor & Co-Convenor.
- Internal exams, such as Mid Term Exams, are scheduled after a significant amount of coursework has been completed, such as two units of the topic.
- The examination cell is responsible for internal examinations, and its Department coordinator works with HODs to draw up internal test papers and evaluate exams.
- Internal exam answer scripts are handed over to students for personal verification.
- After this procedure has been completed, no additional changes will be considered.
- The institution has set a deadline of one week to finish all of this work.
- Any grievances related to the internal exams are brought to the notice of the concerned teacher and get clarified.
- Through the description of the evaluation, the teacher must satisfy/convince the student.
- A proper communication is sent to university through college when there are any grievances related to mark statements and certificates. Our university will communicate with us and we can do welfare to the students.

Students of all years are also allowed to carry out mini projects and major projects in the same laboratories in different time slots using the same lab infrastructure beyond the working hours.
- Regular backups have been used in case of any risk of information.
- For administrative information security, user level authentication access is followed.
- For network security, standard firewall and antivirus are in place

Wi-Fi facility: The Wi-Fi facility is enabled in all Blocks in the College campus.

Access to online teaching and learning resources are provided in the following manner:

Trinity College for Women is very keen to provide an online learning environment to the student Community. Opportunity is provided to the faculty and students to use the Digital library in the College. They can access the e-books, e-journals, Course materials, within the campus through LAN and Wi-Fi facility. The library is automated with RFID tags for books and RFID reader

LAN facility: The entire College has been connected using Local Area Network in Star topology with LAN speed of 1Gbps. 10 Mbps BSNL Leased Line internet facilities are provided.

The following are the ICT facilities available in the College, to enhance the quality of teaching and learning process,

- One seminar halls and five classrooms are enabled with ICT facilities to facilitate seminars and other invited talks by external experts.
- LCD projectors are used by the faculty members for interactive learning through presentations. Apart from Black board, our faculty members are taking classes through YouTube, Zoom, Google Meet, WebEx meet, etc.,

BEST PRACTICE: 1

TITLE OF THE PRACTICE: "CLEAN AND GREEN ENVIRONMENT"

OBJECTIVES:

We create awareness among the next generation of students to save natural resources. We aim to save resources and maintain a clean and green environment.

THE CONTEXT:

We have fantastic buildings and their infrastructures are set in wholly natural phenomena and our college is surrounded with many varieties of flora. With the help of Service Club our institution undergoes several programs regarding environmental protection, eco-friendly rally, green technology, planting trees, non-plastic usage, pollution, bio-energy, bio-degradable products and whatever.

THE PRACTICE:

- We have a very great impact on the environment. We have shown their keen interest towards the environment.
- Seed balls are one of the easiest and sustainable ways of cultivating plants. We disperse the seed balls in Siddhar Hills and its surroundings periodically.

- Students are motivated to plant the saplings in the Campus and nearby areas. We organize more awareness programmes related to global warming.
- The institution has observed Jal Shakti Abhiyan to water conservation & water resource management.
- We celebrate various environmental related days.
- Swachh Bharat Abhiyan has been launched by our College.
- We installed new LED lights in the Science block and it is partly installed in the main block.
- Solar panels have been placed in our campus to produce solar electricity directly.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS:

Especially in order to protect the environment, the napkins used by the students are destroyed with modern machines. A rainwater harvesting tank is available in the college. All the students and faculty members are using our College free bus facility. They use the college bus more for their transportation instead of using their own vehicles. As a result, the emission of carbon dioxide is reduced in the college campus. In this regard, the campus is more clean and friendly to the environment.

PROBLEM ENCOUNTERED:

BEST PRACTICE: 2

TITLE OF THE PRACTICE:

ENHANCEMENT OF STUDENTS’ - INTELLIGENCE ‘SELF-LEARNING’ THROUGH SEMINARS

OBJECTIVE:

Each student has unique intelligence and they thrive in certain learning environments while struggling in others. The eight different types of intelligence, as put forth by Howard Gardner, are zeniths owing to the distinct atmosphere faced by the students. We encourage them to go ahead with seminars and to demonstrate their skills to their juniors.

THE CONTEXT:

Learner-centered and constructivist teaching & multi-grade classes are the scenario in the Indian educational system. Yet, we as a state of agricultural background and meager-livelihood of most parents, face problems in designing and implementing this practice, for a significant mass of our students come from rural sides. Hence we have to begin with shaping the very mindset of our student-folk and to

offer a pivotal transformation of average to top in their learning process.

UTILIZATION OF LIBRARY

Library is a vital instrument for academic development. It is a storehouse of information. We have given assignments for our students. They utilize the library facilities.

Debates and Quiz Programmes

Classroom democracy is always induced to raise questions after the class sessions without reluctance. Topics relevant for healthy discussions are chosen in advance. Students are expected to prepare the raw material for debates and to present them in the class for peer-review. Debates range from the extension of syllabus covered to the scenario world-wide and feedback is sought from the students after every debate. Quiz is an informal test or examination of class students. We conduct these programmes.

SEMINARS

Academic seminars help engage in high-level debates and refine ideas and our students never miss such opportunities. Seminars boost up the self-confidence in the student community and enhance their self-learning. They also acquire presentation and communication skills which in turn mould their overall personality and prepare them for a rapidly changing future full of alien challenges. Success is essential to any planned activity. It was the students of Mathematics who initiated the ESI subject for the first time. Later, following that, students from other departments also became interested in participating in this subject. Apart from University curriculum, the students acquired a knowledge and presentation of recent topics like Soft skills, Entrepreneurship, and others. The students actively participated in the initiative with the standard technology next to blackboard learning, ICT, which is in use in the college, and took the lessons in an excellent manner. Around 75 students participated in this program and expressed their talents through PPT. While studying in college, they are also doing teaching work, so the idea of becoming a teacher has been imprinted on their minds as students.
